

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
Democratic - Voter Turnout & Method

Early Voting Site Turnout



Two additional satellite Early Voting sites were opened at Madison and Walter Reed Community Centers on February 24, 27, 29, and March 2.



Democratic Primary

9,905 Democratic Primary ballots were mailed to voters who requested one. This includes reissued ballots (ballots reported lost or spoiled) and email ballots (UOCAVA and ADA voters). 9,024 ballots mailed were from the Permanent Absentee (PAB) List. 5,232 ballots were counted. 245 ballots were exchanged so that the voter could vote in person. 29 ballots were rejected.

Republican Primary

1,500 Republican Primary ballots were mailed to voters who requested one. This includes reissued ballots (ballots reported lost or spoiled) and email ballots (UOCAVA and ADA voters). 1,207 ballots mailed were from the Permanent Absentee (PAB) List. 924 ballots were counted. 106 ballots were exchanged so that the voter could vote in person. 6 ballots were rejected.

UOCAVA


UOCAVA is a special category of mail ballot voters. These are voters who are either in the military or reside overseas. These voters are eligible to receive their ballots by mail or email.

ADA


In August 2020, Virginia entered into an agreement to allow print disabled voters the ability to use the online tool for UOCAVA voters to mark their ballots from home.


Return Method

Nine 24-hour drop boxes were available from January 23 to March 5, 2024. Drop boxes were also available at the 3 Early Voting and 54 Polling Locations while the sites were open for in-person delivery. 1,292 ballots were returned using a drop box. This includes 222 returned to polling places on Election Day and 75 returned at Early Voting sites.

Mail Ballots Exchanged for In-Person Ballots

A total of 245 voters who requested a Democratic Primary mail ballot and 106 voters who requested a Republican Primary mail ballot chose to vote in-person. Voters had several options to change from a mail ballot to an in-person ballot. Voters could exchange their mail ballot for an in-person ballot at Early Voting and sign a statement authorizing our office to reissue a ballot during. On Election Day voters could cast a provisional ballot at their assigned precinct.

Issues or Rejections

Mail ballots can be 'rejected' in two ways - by the scanner when being tallied or a material omission. A material omission occurs when something is missing on a ballot's return materials, such as the voter's signature.

Voters were permitted to "cure" or correct omissions on their mail ballots up until noon the Friday after the election. 37 of the voters contacted for the Democratic Primary cured their ballots. 14 of the voters contacted for the Republican Primary cured their ballots.


Ballots that are rejected by the scanner are hand counted by a team of election officers. If voter intent can be determined, these ballots are counted.


No wait times were reported at any time on Election Day.



Election Officer Performance

A post-election survey of Election Officers revealed:

- 88% of all Chief Election Officers "Agreed" or "Mostly Agreed" their Election Officers were appropriately trained for election day.
- 96% of Chief Election Officers "Agreed" they were provided with adequate support from the main office and rovers on election day.



Provisional Data

A provisional ballot is issued when a voter's eligibility cannot be determined on Election Day.



Same Day Registration


Voters who miss the registration deadline may register or update their name and address in-person during Early Voting or at their polling place on Election Day. All new registrations received after the deadline vote a provisional ballot. Same Day Registration began on February 13, 2024.

Democratic Primary Provisional Ballot Age Ranges




Republican Primary Provisional Ballot Age Ranges



Administration

Staffing

The office has 9 permanent employees. Between January 15 to March 8, these employees worked a combined total of 109.25 hours of overtime hours.

A total of 58 temporary employees were hired from January 15 – March 8. They worked a total of 37.25 overtime hours during this time.

46 Election Officers and temporary and permanent employees, noted above, staffed and managed the early voting locations and Central Absentee Precinct.

336 Election Officers worked on Election Day.
